Search Begins for Iowa's Best Burger

Iowa's cattle producers are asking their fellow Iowans to help find Iowa's Best Burger in 2018. In this year's quest, the Iowa Beef Industry Council (IBIC) and the Iowa Cattlemen's Association (ICA) are encouraging you to nominate your favorite burger, whether it's gourmet or down-home style.

This is the ninth year the two groups are holding the annual Iowa's Best Burger contest, which officially kicked off February 12. The nomination period will close at 5 p.m. on March 12, 2018. To qualify to be named Iowa's Best Burger, the burger must be a 100% beef patty and served on a bun or bread product.

"We are excited to begin the search for this year's best burger in Iowa," comments Katie Olthoff, Director of Communications for the ICA. "This year, our goal is to get new restaurants involved in the contest. We know we have many restaurants across the state serving a great beef burger."

In order to recognize these great burgers, IBIC and ICA are asking Iowans to nominate their favorite burger for the award, and those nominations can be made online or by text. Details about the contest, rules, and the voting form are available on the Iowa Beef Industry Council's website, www.iabeef.org. Burger lovers can also find a link to the online nomination form at the Iowa Beef Council Facebook page; or by texting BEEF to 313131. Photos of your favorite burger can be shared socially using #IABestBurger.

"Restaurants can download a digital toolkit including promotional materials for the contest from IBIC's website at iabeef.org to promote the contest to their customers," says Brooke German, Director of Marketing for the IBIC. "The promotional materials can be used in their restaurants or online such as their social media platforms."

The nomination period ends March 12, 2018. German noted that the top 10 restaurants with the most votes are eligible for the title of Iowa's Best Burger. The top ten finalists will be announced on March 19. Finalists will receive a certificate and will be eligible for the secret taste-test of contest judges. The 2018 Best Burger in Iowa will be announced on May 1 with the kick-off of May Beef Month in Iowa.

"Funded by the Iowa State Beef Checkoff program, this contest not only promotes Iowa's restaurants serving great beef burgers, but also Iowa's beef farmers producing safe, wholesome and nutritious products for consumers," says Steve Rehder, chairman of the Iowa Beef Industry Council. "It is a great partnership between the Iowa Cattlemen's Association and the Iowa Beef Industry Council to promote Iowa's beef industry which generates an estimated \$6.03 billion in economic activity in the state."

In 2017, nearly 9,200 nominations for 500 restaurants were received in the contest. The final winners in previous years are: 2017 – The Smokin' Hereford BBQ, Storm Lake; 2016 – The Chuckwagon Restaurant, Adair; 2015 – The Cider House, Fairfield; 2014 – Brick City Grill, Ames; 2013 – 61 Chop House Grille, Mediapolis; 2012 – Coon Bowl III, Coon Rapids; 2011 – Rusty Duck, Dexter; 2010 – Sac County Cattle Company, Sac City.

Seed Treatment Course Scheduled for February 28

Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Pocahontas County will host a Seed Treatment Continuing Instruction Course (CIC) for commercial pesticide applicators, Wednesday, February 28. The program will be shown at locations across Iowa through the Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Pesticide Safety Education Program (PSEP).

Registration begins at 8:30 a.m., and the course runs from 9 to 11 a.m. To register or to obtain additional information about the CIC, contact Dianne Dirks at the Iowa State University Extension and Outreach office in Pocahontas County by phoning 712-335-3103 or email dianned@iastate.edu.

The course will provide continuing instruction credit for commercial pesticide applicators certified in categories 4 and 10. Topics to be covered include equipment calibration and safe application techniques; pests, pest management and pesticides; and issues concerning treated seed, including disposal of unused treated seed.

Certified Crop Advisor (CCA) Continuing Education Units (CEUs) will be offered. Interested participants should bring their CCA number to the program.

Celebrating 100 Years

Under the fertilizer section, it suggests fertilizer rates for 30bu/acre corn and devotes an entire chapter on how to pick out ears of corn to plant next year's crop from.

The car was a new addition to rich families, but needed to be overhauled each winter. Most of the pictures had horses in them.

Electricity on farms was still many years away. So, water was pumped with windmills, or by hand.

Today ISU Extension has brought research-based information to help advance the production of Iowa's land, and improve people's lives.

It is interesting to reflect back to see how our rural population, and small communities, have pulled together to use the university's research to make all of our lives better during the past 100 years. NW Iowa Beef Bonanza Held

The 2018 Northwest Iowa Beef Bonanza was held on Saturday, February 3rd at the Iowa Lakes Community College in Emmetsburg. There were 70 youth represented from 11 counties.

Mark Jensen, ILCC Beef Instructor, taught the session "It's Not a Shot in the Dark," which taught youth the difference between intramuscular (IM) and subcutaneous (SubQ) shots.

Judith LaBounty, an Emergency Management Veterinarian for IDALS, and Beth Doran, a Beef Specialist for Iowa State University Extension and Outreach, taught the session "OUTBREAK!". They taught youth about disease outbreaks and what to do if you have one on your farm.

Darcy Maulsby, a writer for Farm News, author, and speaker taught a session called "Telling It Like It Is," which taught youth how they could advocate for the beef industry by telling their stories.

Youth also attended a session titled "Your Bottom Line" taught by Al Patten and Jeremy Truog from Farm Credit Services of America. Youth learned some interesting facts and trends in the cattle industry and how all that financially affects your bottom line.





Finances of Caregiving Series-A Family Affair

A unique group of 'Family Caregivers' living in our community are providing unpaid caregiving for adults who, because of physical impairments or failing memory, can no longer complete their day-to-day activities. Regardless of how to take first caregiving actions or make complex money decisions, a March 2018 "Finances of Caregiving" five-week workshop series brings national resources, community partners and tools assisting family caregivers to Iowans to protect their finances. The Iowa State University Extension and Outreach program registration closes on Monday, March 19.

Iowa caregivers documented in 2015 provided 24 to 40 hours helping with household chores, shopping and transportation. Their roles included managing finances, medications and overseeing nursing and medical tasks, spending some \$5,531 annually out of their own pockets.

The "Finances of Caregiving" research evidence based program

provides materials to assist caregivers in protecting their assets and prepare for their retirement while providing care. This fiveweek program, beginning on March 22 through April 19 (five consecutive Thursdays); will meet at the Pocahontas County Extension and Outreach Office from 11:30 a.m.-1:00 p.m. The workshop fee of \$35 provides attendees workshop resources. Participants, feel free to bring your own sack lunch or snack.

"Understanding caregiving choices means knowing your current situation," says Carol Ehlers, Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Human Science Specialist, Family Finance.

"This workshop series provides caregivers and care receivers guides and tools to explore information and resources for a tailored response to adult's day-to-day affairs.

This program is offered through a collaboration including: Pocahontas Community Hospital, Pocahontas County Public Health, Pocahontas County Home Care Aide Agency and ISU Extension and Outreach Pocahontas County.

Free Tax Filing Helps LowerIncome Iowans Keep More of Their Refunds

An income tax refund provides an important annual financial boost for many Iowa families. Claiming that tax refund, however, is sometimes more expensive than it needs to be, according to Barb Wollan, a human sciences specialist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

"I talk to people all the time whose tax refunds are equal to one to three months of income. They rely on their tax refund to accomplish the financial goals they've set for the year," said Wollan, who specializes in family finance.

"People sometimes resign themselves to spending \$100-\$300 in tax preparation fees, deciding it's 'worth it' in order to get their tax refund, which may be a few thousand dollars," Wollan said. "However, if they didn't pay for tax preparation, they would certainly find a good use for the extra few hundred dollars."

The good news is that there are at least two ways for low and moderate-income households to

file their taxes for free, Wollan said.

Volunteer Income Tax
Assistance. Volunteer Income Tax
Assistance is an IRS-sponsored
program in which certified
volunteer tax preparers work with
taxpayers to file their income tax
returns for free. VITA sites are
intended for low and moderate
income taxpayers, with some
flexibility in income guidelines
depending on an individual's

Volunteers are equipped to prepare returns with a range of tax issues, including the most common types of income and tax credits. There are, however, some tax issues that volunteers are not allowed to address, including farm and rental income and some types of small business returns.

situation.

In many Iowa counties, ISU Extension and Outreach is a partner in VITA, often hosting VITA sites and assisting with site management. ISU Extension specialists also provide training and technical support to some Iowa sites.

"VITA volunteers work in pairs or teams with careful quality monitoring processes to ensure accurate tax returns," said Wollan. "These caring and capable individuals work to help taxpayers understand their tax returns, and to inform them about opportunities to claim deductions or credits in the future."

A list of ISU Extension and Outreach county offices that are

hosting VITA sites for the current tax year is available online at https://www.extension.iastate.edu/humansciences/vita.

To find a VITA site anywhere in the nation, go to www.irs.gov and search for VITA.

"The IRS website also lists free tax preparation sites operated by AARP, which are similar to VITA sites. Some tax sites operate on an appointment basis, while other sites offer walk-in service. The listing found on the website will provide the information you need," Wollan said.

IRS 'Free File' option.

For taxpayers who are fairly comfortable with computers, the IRS offers an online "Free File" option as well. Learn more at www.irs.gov/filing/free-file-do-your-federal-taxes-for-free. This service results from a collaboration of various commercial tax software providers who make their software available free to qualifying consumers. The software packages are user-friendly, designed for people who are not tax experts.

"Before paying to have your taxes prepared, consider making use of one of the free options," suggests Wollan. "If you are not able to take advantage of free tax preparation, shop wisely when selecting tax preparation software or a professional tax preparer, and avoid paying fees for refund loans and other non-essential products or services. Your tax refund is a return of your money – keep it for your own use."
