

## Case 175th Anniversary Celebration

The 47th annual Threshermen & Collectors Show looks like it will be a record-breaker. This year marks the celebration of the 175th anniversary of Case. The association will host two international and five regional Case Collectors Clubs. Enthusiasts and exhibitors are expected to come from all over the world to celebrate the anniversary. The show has expanded to four days this year, August 10-13, and will be jam-packed with many special events.

**EXPERIENCE THE EVOLUTION: In the Field.** This special anniversary event will demonstrate the evolution of Case engines, tractors and implements by doing many of the typical farm activities out in the field. Imagine seeing a Case 110 steam engine plowing in the field right along with a new Case 620 QuadTrac with other generations in between! Classic Tractor Fever will be filming this event along with other show activities for their show on RFD-TV. Case collectors who wish to participate in this event should register in advance by calling the show office at 712-843-2076.

Along with the Experience the Evolution in the Field, there will be a special line-up of J. I. Case engines, tractors and implements from the beginning to present-day that show the evolution of Case. Visitors will enjoy walking this historical line-up that shows the innovation of the Case line over the last 175 years.

**Other Special Events.** The Ladies of Steam are two women from South Dakota who regularly provide seminars to those interested in steam engines. These seminars will take place Friday-Sunday at about 11:30 a.m.

On Friday evening, there will be a tractor pull for Case tractors only. Along with the tractor pull, a Case-o-matic demonstration will be held that duplicates the demonstration Case held at the 100 Series World Premier in Phoenix, AZ.

An attempt to set a record for the most Eagle hitch plows in the same field will take place Saturday afternoon following the Evolution in the Field.

There will be an all-Case equipment and machinery auction held Saturday morning starting at 7 a.m.

At the last Case feature show at Albert City in 2011, there were seven Case autos. That's quite a few to be in one place at one time. This year look for more than that number! Already more than seven are planning to attend.

The Threshermen Experience. With the expansion to four days this year, the Threshermen have organized a fun day of activities for Thursday. The annual tractor ride will be held starting at 1 p.m. New this year will be the "Threshermen Experience." Visitors can participate in hands-on training, demonstrations and presentations throughout the day. There is something for everyone to enjoy. Seminars include: carburetor rebuilding, blacksmithing, threshing, broom-making, kid's tractor driving, quilting, tatting, spinning wool, carpentry, and horse activities. There will also be a presentation on the Early History of Farming in Pocahontas County and a presentation at Freedom Hall explaining the 13 folds of the American Flag.

The annual threshing show is full of live demonstrations and activities. These will again include a horse-drawn wagon train, tractor ride, Iowa Draft Pony Show, the Civil War Encampment by the Army of the Southwest, working sawmill, blacksmith shop, broom making, flour mill and tractor and gas engine displays. Field activities include plowing, discing, raking, threshing, corn shelling, binding, combining, and balling along with several horse-drawn field demonstrations and the popular Kids' Potato Patch. Exhibit buildings include Freedom Hall, the old farm house, grandpa's barn, the old schoolhouse, and Svenska Stuga (Swedish house replica.) There are daily parades at 10:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., and antique tractor pull Saturday morning.

The show site is located just a few miles northwest of Albert City, Iowa or about 15 miles northeast of Storm Lake.

## Canning is Making a Comeback

Want to learn the fine art of canning, freezing and drying fruits and vegetables? Iowa State University (ISU) Extension and Outreach in Pocahontas County is offering a program that will benefit both beginning and experienced preservers. Food Preservation 101 will be held Thursday, June 15, 2017.

"Canning, drying and preserving food is an old art that is making a comeback," said Katie Knobbe, ISU Extension nutrition and wellness program specialist and program presenter. "It's all part of the trend to know where your food comes from, what is in it, and to eat fresh, local foods."

The class will include food safety information, guidelines for canning, freezing and drying, an overview of equipment and utensils for canning and freezing and up to date resources and recipes for safe and tasty food preservation. Participants will also learn about Preserve the Taste of Summer, the food preservation course available from ISU Extension.

"Food preservation is a wonderful way to extend the taste and nutrition of the garden throughout the whole year," said Knobbe.

First time preservers are encouraged to attend this class as well as anyone who would like to update their canning, freezing, and dehydrating skills.

"Canning the way grandma did it may not be safe," said Knobbe. "Everyone needs to be using up-to-date canning and food preservation processes and recipes."

## Yard and Garden: Caring for Newly Planted Trees

Iowa has millions of trees across its landscape, and many are planted each year. But when they are, they require multiple steps and focused care to ensure their success and growth.

ISU Extension and Outreach horticulturists can help answer your questions about how to best care for newly planted trees. To have additional questions answered, contact the ISU Hortline at 515-294-3108 or hortline@iastate.edu.

How often should a newly planted tree be watered? The key to watering newly planted balled and burlapped and container-grown trees is to keep the plant's root-ball moist for several weeks after planting. Water newly planted trees every day for six or seven days and then gradually reduce the frequency of watering. When watering, slowly apply water to the root-ball and the surrounding soil. A thorough watering every seven to 10 days (in dry weather) should be sufficient four to six weeks after planting. Continue this watering schedule through summer and into fall. Small trees usually require watering for one or two growing seasons. It may be necessary to periodically water large trees for two or three years.

To what degree should a newly planted tree be pruned? Trees utilize sugars and other carbohydrates manufactured by the foliage for plant growth. Pruning of newly planted trees should be limited to corrective pruning. (Severe pruning reduces the tree's ability to manufacture food and slows plant growth.) Remove structural defects, such as double leaders and dead, broken or crossing branches. Retain most of the lower branches to help stabilize the tree. The lower branches also provide food for the growing tree. Gradually remove the lower limbs as the tree grows during the first five to 10 years.

**Should a newly planted tree be fertilized?** It is generally not necessary to fertilize newly planted trees. Most Iowa soils can supply sufficient amounts of nutrients during establishment. If the tree is growing poorly two to three years after planting, fertilization may be beneficial. Poorly growing trees typically exhibit sparse foliage, yellow-green leaves or short annual twig growth.

**Should a newly planted tree be staked?** Staking is not required for most newly planted trees. However, top-heavy trees and those planted in windy, exposed sites may require staking. If staking is necessary, allow the trunk to move or sway for proper trunk and root development. To prevent damage to the trunk, use strong, wide strips of canvas, rubber or other materials to support the tree. Remove the stakes as soon as possible. Stakes can often be removed after one growing season.

**Should the trunk of a newly planted tree be wrapped?** Wrapping protective materials around the trunks of newly planted trees is usually not necessary. If you do decide to use a tree wrap, place it around the trunk of the tree in fall (November) and promptly remove it the following spring (April). Wrapping the trunks of young trees in fall may discourage rabbit browsing and sunscald in winter.

## Caregivers Face Transitions with Loved Ones

One of the many challenges faced by people in caregiving situations is dealing with changes that occur in those relationships. Spouses who enjoyed traveling together over a lifetime now may be home-bound. Adult children who enjoyed mom's home-cooked meals for holidays may find themselves arranging for her daily nutritional needs. These changes and many others lead to transitions that mark the progression of illness or aging, says Dr. David Brown, a human sciences specialist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

"Often the transitions, and the decisions that must come with them, are difficult because they lead to some type of loss. It helps to understand the process we go through when we deal with the transitions," said Dr. Brown, who specializes in family life issues.

Learning to deal with transitions is part of "Powerful Tools for Caregivers," a series of classes designed to empower family caregivers to take better care of themselves, whether they provide care for adults with chronic conditions or children with special health and behavioral needs. ISU Extension and Outreach offers the six-week series in which caregivers gain "tools" to reduce stress, improve caregiving confidence, establish

balance in their lives, communicate their needs, make tough decisions and locate helpful resources.

"The Caregiver Helpbook," provided during the "Powerful Tools for Caregivers" classes explains three stages in dealing with transitions: the ending, the wilderness period and the new beginning. "The transition starts with the ending, the 'letting go' of what has ended. You may not want to do this, but you must so you can move on to what is next," Brown said.

Grandma no longer can grow a garden after years of canning, freezing and sharing her produce with the family, for example. This is a loss for Grandma, who may miss the activity, the joy of sharing and the idea that she can provide for herself.

It is also a loss for you, for the image you had of Grandma as hail and healthy, and the product itself, which represents much more than mere food to you both.

Because of a gradual but steady decline, those with chronic, progressive illnesses must cope with a series of ongoing endings. This happens when Dad, who is experiencing signs of dementia, is no longer a safe driver.

"You will manage the change – sell the car, cancel the insurance, arrange for alternate transportation. However, the 'letting go' may never happen, because Dad's increasing dementia makes it impossible for him to remember that he no longer drives. It may result in disbelief, sadness or anger each time he hears

the news," Dr. Brown said.

During the wilderness period both caregiver and care receiver come to grips with the change and loss.

"You may experience confusion, emptiness, depression, uncertainty and anxiety. This is a difficult stage because most of us want to 'solve' situations right away. We do not like to wander! Give yourself time and be patient with yourself. This period cannot be rushed," Dr. Brown said.

During this time, it is important to maintain routines and structures as much as possible. This gives a sense of predictability.

"Take care of yourself as well, by eating well and getting plenty of sleep. Stay in touch with supportive people. Look for the positive in the change and avoid doing something just for the sake of taking action," Dr. Brown advised.

The new beginning comes after the wilderness and may start as vague or unimpressive.

You may wake up one day to a subtle feeling that you are ready for something new. You may feel more refreshed and find that you are looking for opportunities. You have begun on a new and still-changing life.

"If you provide care for a loved one, you're not alone. More than 65 million people in the U.S., that's nearly 30 percent of our population, provided care for a chronically ill, disabled or aging family member or friend last year alone. Many of these people spent more than 20 hours per week giving care, according to the Caregiver Action Network," Dr. Brown said.
