

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# ISU Extension and Outreach Offers Weeds Week Aug. 3-7

Weeds, herbicides and the effectiveness of herbicides to control weeds are topics of agronomic and economic importance to farmers and agribusinesses. It is so important that Iowa State University Extension and Outreach field agronomists are hosting Weeds Week, a weeklong series of informational meetings. The half-day sessions will be held Aug. 3-7 at five Iowa State University research farms.

"Farmers are challenged with producing crops and implementing effective weed management programs in a profitable manner," said Virgil Schmitt, field agronomist with ISU Extension and Outreach in southeast Iowa. "Our goal is to help farmers develop effective weed management plans."

Schmitt said the meetings are intended to help farmers and ag retailers support each other in this process.

"By supporting each other, they can increase their profitability and minimize negative impacts on the environment," Schmitt said. "The sessions have been developed to provide tools that help farmers and agribusinesses work together to develop long-term weed management plans that identify sites of action, promote timely application of herbicides and avoid the expenses of dealing with herbicide resistance."

Each session will include presentations, hands-on weed management planning, small group discussion and plot tours presented by extension field agronomists. In the farmer-oriented session, farmers will learn how to select herbicides from the herbicide effectiveness table, identify which herbicides to apply and develop their own four-year weed management plan. Agribusiness representatives will receive similar information, but it will be presented with a focus on how to support farmers and their operations.

The schedule has been developed so that the morning sessions will conclude with lunch and the afternoon sessions will begin with lunch, which is included in the registration.

# ISU Extension and Outreach Provides Resources on Human Impact of Avian Influenza

In response to the recent avian influenza outbreak, Iowa State University Extension and Outreach has launched a multi-state approach to providing research-based information and resources to families.

"By leveraging our resources and strategically sharing information with families throughout Iowa, Minnesota and South Dakota, we are able to provide daily updates and recommendations," said Debra Sellers, director of Human Sciences Extension and Outreach and associate dean in Iowa State's College of Human Sciences. ISU Extension and Outreach is cooperating on the project with South Dakota State University Extension and University of Minnesota Extension.

Together, extension staff from the three landgrant universities will provide families with information on everything from food safety education and stretching food dollars as the cost of eggs and poultry increases to implementing strategies to manage a family's finances and stress during tough times.

"Avian influenza has had a very real impact on families," Sellers explained. "Our counterparts in ISU Extension and Outreach's Agriculture and Natural Resources program are working to address producer issues. However, this group will focus on the families struggling with the human challenges brought on by avian influenza, whether that is ensuring families are implementing the proper food safety techniques when preparing eggs and poultry, the loss of employment or dealing with seeing their food budget increase, as eggs, which are traditionally an inexpensive protein source, have more than doubled in price."

# Yard and Garden: Keeping Roses Healthy

Several common disease problems can damage a rose's natural beauty. Disease organisms can

cause unsightly leaves, reduced flower production and result in the death of leaves or even the entire plant. Iowa State University Extension and Outreach horticulturists give advice on how to keep roses healthy and protected from these diseases. There are round holes in the foliage of my roses. What is responsible for the damage? Leafcutting bees are most likely responsible for holes in rose foliages. Leafcutting bees resemble honey bees but are often darker in color.

Female leafcutting bees tend to make nests in rotted wood or the stems of plants. The sides of the nesting cavities are lined with round pieces of foliage. After lining the cavities with leaf discs, pollen and nectar are placed in the nest cells to serve as food for the immature bees.

Leafcutting bees may remove discs of foliage from many plants. However, they prefer rose, green ash, redbud, lilac and Virginia creeper. Holes in the leaves are typically onehalf inch or less in diameter. The cuts are clean, as if they were "punched out" with a paper punch.

> Leafcutting bees are beneficial pollinators. Damage to roses and other plants is usually minor and control efforts are rarely justified or necessary.

Small, green worms are eating the foliage on my

roses. What can I do? The small, green "worms" are probably the larvae of the rose sawfly. Rose sawfly larvae, commonly referred to as roseslug, have tapered bodies, may be up to a half-inch in length, and are pale green in color. The larvae somewhat resemble slugs, hence the common name of roseslug.

Rose sawfly larvae usually feed on the undersides of the rose leaves. They consume most of the green tissue of the leaf, leaving behind a thin layer of tissue and veins which eventually turns light brown. Foliage damaged by roseslugs has a windowpane or skeletonized appearance.

Small numbers of roseslugs can be picked off by hand and destroyed. However, larger infestations can be controlled with insecticides, such as: insecticidal soap, carbaryl (Sevin) or permethrin (Eight).

How can I control blackspot on my roses? Blackspot is a common fungal disease of roses. Symptoms of blackspot are circular, black spots on leaves. Initially, symptoms develop on the lower leaves and gradually move upward. Infected leaves will turn yellow and drop prematurely. By late summer, severely infected plants may be nearly defoliated.

The blackspot fungus overwinters on fallen leaves and infected canes. Spores are splashed onto newly emerging foliage in spring. Blackspot development is favored by warm, wet weather. Careful rose selection, cultural practices and fungicide treatments can be used to control blackspot on roses. Rose cultivars differ widely in their susceptibility to blackspot.

When purchasing roses, select rose cultivars that are resistant to blackspot and choose a planting site that receives full sun and provides good air movement. Full sun and good air movement promote drying of rose foliage and discourage blackspot infections. When watering roses, apply water directly to the ground around the plants. Do not wet the foliage.

Reduce the amount of overwintering fungi by carefully cleaning up leaf debris in fall. Fungicide applications must begin at the first sign of disease symptoms.

# Healthy Home Workshop Highlights Energy Efficiency

Iowa State University Extension and Outreach, in collaboration with Iowa Central Community College, is offering a workshop for creating a healthy home environment while maintaining energy efficiency. "Creating Energy Efficient Healthy Homes" will be Saturday, Aug. 1, from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., at the Iowa Central Community College East Campus, 2031 Quail Avenue, Fort Dodge, Iowa.

Participants will get a chance to evaluate energy efficiency of occupied buildings and home construction and potential energy savings. The workshop is for residential in-town and rural acreage homeowners, farm shop owners and farm facility (grain drying and livestock housing) owners. Even commercial business owners, city and county facility managers will benefit from attending.

"The workshop brings forward concepts that can be applied to any home or any occupied building space," said Kapil Arora, agricultural and biosystems engineering specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach. "Advanced energy-efficient construction practices used in today's buildings are a possibility for all Iowa residents. This new energy-efficient technology makes homes more affordable, comfortable and healthy."

# Farmland Leasing and Land Value Meeting to be Offered in Pocahontas County

More than half of Iowa farmland is rented. In some Iowa locations, as much as 70 percent of the land is farmed by farmers who don't own the land

In Northwest Iowa, the result is many conversations and negotiations between farmland owners and producer-tenants to determine what makes sense for farmland leases and cash rental rates.

These are just a few reasons why Iowa State University Extension and Outreach offers workshops designed to answer questions that land owners and tenants have about farmland leasing and land values.

These workshops will be held across northwest Iowa counties starting July 23 through July 31.

Melissa O'Rourke, ISU Extension Farm & Agribusiness Management Specialist will present a wide range of topics related to farmland values and leasing.

"Year after year, I receive numerous contacts from persons who have questions about farmland values and rental rates," says O'Rourke.

"Due to the volatility of land and commodity markets, we have seen had increased inquiries regarding flexible cash lease methodologies," says O'Rourke. "There are dozens of methods for putting together flexible cash lease arrangements, and we will work through several examples."

O'Rourke has also had calls from landowners about filing landlord liens to help assure the rent is paid, so she will be present some information on that topic."

O'Rourke has also seen that farmland owners and producertenants need to have more conversation about the cost of inputs to put in the crop and reasonable expectations on profit margins.

"ISU Extension and Outreach

has good resources for people to use to gain an understanding of how crop input costs can be considered in setting cash lease rates, and I'll show how those can be used." O'Rourke also noted is the increasing age of farmland owners. "ISU Extension research indicates that the average age of farmland owners continues to rise," stated O'Rourke. "Fifty-five percent of Iowa's farmland is owned by people over the age of 65, while 28 percent of the land is owned by individuals over age 75. We find that children and surviving spouses may be less likely to continue

operating the farm themselves. That's a major reason why farmland leasing continues to increase."

O'Rourke encourages anyone with an interest in farmland rental rates to attend these meetings. "Both farmland owners and producertenants should attend. In fact, the ideal situation is for these folks to attend together and then sit down at the kitchen table to discuss their farm

lease arrangements for the coming year."

Workshop attendees will receive a comprehensive workbook packed with information about land values, leasing and different types of farm lease arrangements. "Everyone should leave with a heightened understanding of farmland leasing.

A registration fee of \$20 per person is charged to cover costs and includes a 90-page workbook. Walk-ins may attend for a \$25 fee at the door. Pocahontas County Extension and Outreach will be hosting farmland leasing meeting on Thursday, July 30, 2015 at 9:00am at West Iowa Bank in Laurens (202 W Main St.)
