Laurens Prairie Preservation Trail Signs Refreshed

Iowa Forests Are Teeming with Bird Life

Forests provide critical habitat for Iowa's wildlife, and that is especially true for birds.

Even though forests cover only 7% of the state, more than 150 species of birds use Iowa's forests at some point during the year. In a new publication called "Iowa's Forest Birds," Adam Janke, assistant professor and extension wildlife specialist at Iowa State University, and two co-authors examine the variety of ways birds use forests.

Some species spend most of their time in the overstory of trees, some in the midstory and some in the understory. Additionally, some live most of their lives in the forest, while others only rely on the forest for occasional use or when migrating.

The publication examines all of the different ways birds use Iowa's forests, as well as when and where keen observers are most likely to spot a specific species.

"A high percentage of Iowa's species of conservation concern are found in forest environments," Janke said. "Even though forests aren't particularly common in Iowa's landscapes, they have a lot of unique diversity that supports bird life."

According to Janke, people often view all forests the same, when in reality, each forest is different and supports a different host of wildlife, including different species of birds.

The publication includes a comparative chart of different trees, shrubs and vines that produce valuable fruits eaten by birds. The publication also covers seasonal information, and how different birds use forests throughout the year.

"There are all different types of forests found in Iowa," he said. "We have forests with rivers and streams, savannahs, young forests and more. Some provide temporary habitat for young birds for example, and others host birds we don't find outside of the forest at all."

The article presents research findings from Iowa and neighboring states that revealed bird distribution within a forest is ultimately driven by forest structure: things like canopy cover, the type, size and growth form of trees and shrubs, and the age of the trees.

Some birds are drawn to the deeper, central parts of the forest, while other species are more drawn to forest edges.

The publication also offers guidance on how to maintain a healthy forest landscape, which leads to an optimal habitat for birds and other wildlife.

Co-authors included Benjamin West, graduate student in natural resource ecology and management at Iowa State; and Stephen Dinsmore, professor of natural resource ecology and management.

Publications Help Families Make Child Care Decisions During COVID-19

Families are understandably feeling overwhelmed with child care decisions during the COVID-19 pandemic. Child care programs have closed, re-opened and then closed again. Parents of school-agers are struggling to find child care that can accommodate school plans for alternate days and staggered arrival and departure.

"It's like learning to juggle on a rollercoaster," said Lesia Oesterreich, family life state specialist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

ISU Extension and Outreach has developed the COVID-19 Child Care Considerations publication series to help families sort through decisions during these trying times, Oesterreich explained.

- Exploring Child Care Options in a Pandemic discusses the pros and cons of different options and gives tips on finding and paying for child care.
- Child Care in Your Home offers helpful guidance for hiring someone to provide full or part-time care for your children.
- The Transportation Scramble helps parents make good decisions about shared transportation to and from school.
- "I encourage families to carefully weigh their concerns for safety, explore options, decide what will work best for them and have a plan B. While there is no one best solution, there are some workable options to help families get through this challenging time," Oesterreich said.

Yard and Garden: Sowing Grass Seed

Fall is an ideal time to sow grass seed in Iowa

Sowing grass seed at the optimal time of year, selection of a high-quality seed mix appropriate for the site and consistent watering are keys to successfully establishing grass from seed. In this week's Yard and Garden article, Richard Jauron, horticulture specialist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach, offers some insight. When is the best time to sow grass seed in Iowa? Mid-August to mid-September is the best time to seed new lawns and overseed existing lawns in Iowa. Late summer seeding has several advantages over spring seeding. The seeds of cool-season grasses germinate quickly in the warm soil of late summer. The warm days and cool nights of early fall promote rapid turfgrass growth. The growing grass also has less competition from weeds, as few weed seeds germinate in fall. Grass seed can also be sown in spring (April to mid-May) in Iowa. However, spring seeding is often less successful than late-summer seeding.

What should I look for when buying grass seed? When purchasing grass seed, choose a high-quality seed mix that is best adapted to the site. In sunny areas, Kentucky bluegrass is the best choice. Select a seed mix that contains at least two or three bluegrass cultivars. Perennial ryegrass is often included in many bluegrass seed mixes because of its ability to germinate and establish quickly. Use a mixture containing Kentucky bluegrass, perennial ryegrass and fine-leaf fescues in areas that contain sun and shade. The fine-leaf fescues (creeping red fescue, hard fescue, chewings fescue, etc.) are the best grasses for shady locations.

How often should I water a newly seeded area? After seeding, keep the upper 1 inch of soil moist with frequent, light applications of water. Two light applications of water per day are usually sufficient. However, it may be necessary to water three or four times on windy, sunny days. The seeds of most turfgrasses should germinate in two to three weeks if the seedbed is kept uniformly moist. Gradually reduce the frequency of watering, but water more deeply, when the grass seedlings reach a height of 1 to 2 inches.

Stress Management Program Available Virtually to Ag Community

Farming can be stressful in the best of times. Financial worries, unpredictable weather, unpredictable commodity prices, plant pests, livestock diseases and isolation all contribute to farmers' anxiety. And now Iowa's rural communities and families are coping with the unpredictability and imposed isolation produced by the COVID-19 pandemic, as well as the destruction from the derecho that swept through Iowa.

In response to this additional stress, Iowa State University Extension and Outreach, in collaboration with COVID Recovery Iowa, will offer 10 online "Stress on the Farm: Strategies That Help" programs beginning Friday, Aug. 28, said David Brown, behavioral health specialist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

"While our agricultural community has been impacted by COVID-19, many have now experienced extreme losses of their crops, buildings, storage and other hardships that came with the storm. This is all additional stress that is impacting our agricultural community and it's important we're all aware of the signs of stress for ourselves and so that we can be of help to our neighbors," Brown said.

ISU Extension and Outreach will offer Stress on the Farm: Strategies That Help at various dates and times to meet the busy schedules of those in the agricultural community. Each program will last for one-half hour on the following dates and times:
