

Marie I. Wells Passes



Marie I. Wells, age 96, of Laurens, Iowa formerly of Marathon, Iowa died November 25, 2021 at the Laurens Care Center in Laurens, Iowa.

Memorial services took place Saturday, December 4, 2021 at the United Methodist Church in Marathon. Burial was in the Poland Township Cemetery. The Sliefert Funeral Home in Albert City was in charge of the arrangements.

Marie Irene Taylor was born on July 30, 1925 to Mr. and Mrs. Robert Taylor of Milford, Iowa and was the youngest of eight children. She attended Okoboji country school and graduated from Okoboji High School near Milford in 1943.

Marie then attended Iowa State Teachers College in Waterloo (now UNI) for two years and earned a teaching certificate in elementary education. After teaching in West Bend and Estherville for several years, she married Gordon Wells of Marathon in 1947. Three children followed: Marilyn, Larry, and Cheryl.

She returned to teaching in 1953, serving in the Havelock school district until 1959 while taking night school and summer school courses to finish her B.A. The family moved to the A.A. Wells home in Marathon in 1959, and Marie taught remedial reading at the Marathon Consolidate School through 1976. She then trained to become a learning disabilities teacher, working in the Laurens schools until her retirement in 1987, having served the teaching profession for 34 years.

After retiring her adventurous spirit emerged and she took numerous trips with Bertie Paquin and with her daughter, Marilyn, including an Alaskan cruise and white-water rafting, a mule train trip down the Grand Canyon, and a hot air balloon ride on her 80th birthday. She spent many winters in Texas with Irene Johnson, where she also did volunteer tutoring in the local schools. She learned to oil paint and produced many still life pictures that we still enjoy. She also took woodworking classes and made two beautiful wall clocks.

Her many other talents included writing poetry and short stories, composing music and lyrics, and she enjoyed ballroom dancing. She had six stories and six poems published and continued writing until shortly before her death.

Marie is survived by her brother, Orville Taylor of Hartley, IA, daughters Marilyn Wells of Phoenix, AZ, and Cheryl (Scott) Frye of Laurens, IA, grandchildren Christina (Scott) Boudewyns of Des Moines, IA, Amanda Frye of Lincoln, NE, Jacob (Melissa) Frye of Lake View, IA, and great-grandchildren Evie, Owen, and Lincoln.

She was preceded in death by her parents Robert and Verna (Wilson) Taylor, sisters Francis (infant), and Mildred (Taylor) Groff, brothers Lloyd (infant), Howard, Dale, and Glen Taylor, and her son, Larry Wells.

She will be remembered for her fiercely independent spirit and her kind and patient teaching of special needs children. In any contest, she was always an avid supporter of the underdog.

The family expresses thanks and appreciation for the wonderful care that Marie received from the staff at the Laurens Care Center and the Hospice nurses that attended her during her final days.

Beef Quality Assurance Trainings Still Available in 2021

Beef packers are reminding feedlot producers to update or obtain a current Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) certificate. But there are other reasons for certifying – to assure consumer confidence, to improve animal performance, and to expand international demand for U.S. beef.

To help producers accomplish these goals, Iowa State University Extension and Outreach, the Iowa Beef Center and Iowa Beef Industry Council are offering a series of "year-end" trainings in Northwest Iowa.

Trainings are scheduled for the following dates and locations:

- Dec. 9, 10 a.m. to Noon ISU Extension and Outreach Plymouth County office, Le Mars. Pre-register to 712-546-7835.
- Dec. 13, 10 a.m. to Noon ISU Extension and Outreach Buena Vista County office, Storm Lake. Pre-register to 712-732-5056.

There is no cost to attend, but preregistration is required two days in advance of the training. To pre-register, call the phone number listed for the site to be attended.

If an in-person training cannot be attended, BQA certification may be completed on-line at https://bqa. beeflearningcenter.org/.

Beginning Farmer Gathering Dec. 14 in Orange City

Iowa State University Extension and Outreach invites beginning farmers from Northwest Iowa to attend a gathering at the ISU Extension and Outreach Sioux County office in Orange City on Tuesday, December 14 from 6 to 8:30 p.m.

Following a COVID-19 hiatus, this is the first beginning farmer gathering to be held since 2019. The gathering is open to any farmers/ranchers, livestock producers or ag industry professionals who predominantly categorize themselves as "beginning," or ag stakeholders who are looking for objective, research-based educational topics related to the continuing landscape changes in production ag.

"Our Beginning Farmer Gatherings serve several purposes," said Beth Doran, beef specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach. "First of all, they are a time for networking and meeting local peers in agriculture. Secondly, they provide an in-person opportunity to meet and learn from Extension specialists and industry experts. And lastly, they are a lot of fun."

The gatherings always feature time for networking, as well as an education component. Sometimes the group also goes on tours.

On Dec. 14, the focus will be on negotiation skills, featuring Dennis Reyman from Stalcup Ag Services, Inc. as the keynote speaker. ISU Extension and Outreach agriculture specialists will also be on hand to introduce themselves and answer questions, and time will be spent providing a Northwest Iowa Beginning Farmer Group overview, vision, and schedule moving into 2022.

Confinement Site Manure Applicator Workshops Scheduled for 2022

Confinement site manure applicators and anyone interested in learning about manure issues should plan to attend a twohour workshop offered by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach in January or February 2022. These workshops are offered in cooperation with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. Registration is required. No walk-ins allowed. There is no fee to attend the workshops, but applicators will need to pay certification fees and send the forms in to the Iowa Department of Natural Resources to complete certification requirements.

"Iowa law requires confinement site manure applicators to attend two hours of continuing education each year of their three-year certification period or take and pass an exam once every three years," said Dan Andersen, associate professor of agricultural and biosystems engineering and extension

agriculture engineering specialist at Iowa State, and coordinator of the manure applicator certification program.

A total of 64 counties will participate in the confinement site manure applicator workshops. In addition, a series of six dry/solid manure applicator certification meetings will be held in February. These meetings are tailored toward dry/solid manure for either Commercial or Confinement Site manure applicators. ISU Extension and Outreach county offices have a complete list of workshop dates and locations, or view a list at https://www. extension.iastate.edu/immag/ confinement-site-applicators.

The workshops serve as initial certification for those applicators who are not currently certified, recertification for those renewing licenses and continuing education for those applicators in their second or third year of their license.

Due to uniform certification deadlines, applicators are encouraged to attend workshops prior to March 1 to avoid being assessed a late fee of \$12.50 for those who are re-certifying. Those unable to attend one of the workshops need to schedule time with their ISU Extension and Outreach county office to watch the training video. Due to scheduling conflicts, extension

offices will no longer accept walkin appointments to watch these videos but do offer scheduled dates and times to provide this training.

If you can't attend training during one of the scheduled reshow dates at your county extension office, you will be charged a \$10 fee to view the training at your convenience. If attending the workshops or watching the two-hour training video is not convenient, confinement site manure applicators may contact their local Department of Natural Resources field office to schedule an appointment to take the certification exam to meet certification requirements.

Applicators also have another option, online certification; an applicator can take their training online at DNR MAC eLearning site at https://elearning-dnr.iowa.gov/. The applicator will need to sign-in and get an A&A account.

Commercial Manure Applicator Training Set for Jan. 6

Commercial manure applicators can attend annual training to meet commercial manure applicator certification requirements on Thursday, Jan. 6, 2022. Iowa State University Extension and Outreach and the Iowa Department of Natural Resources will conduct Commercial Manure Applicator training from 9 a.m. to noon at 80 locations in Iowa and one in Minnesota. Doors open at 8:30 a.m.

There is no fee for the workshop. Pre-registration is required. No walk-ins allowed. Applicators must register by Dec. 30 with the ISU Extension and Outreach county office where they plan to attend. A complete list of workshop locations can be found at https://www.extension.iastate.edu/immag/commercial-manure-applicators.

Commercial manure applicators needing to recertify and those wanting to certify for the first time should attend. All currently certified commercial manure applicator licenses will expire on March 1, 2022. Those wanting to renew must complete training requirements and submit forms and fees to the Department of Natural Resources prior to March 1, to avoid paying late fees. The law requires all commercial manure applicators to attend three hours of training annually to meet certification requirements. Businesses that primarily truck or haul manure of any type or

from any source are also required to meet certification requirements.

Those unable to attend the program on Jan. 6 need to schedule time with their ISU Extension and Outreach county office to watch the training Blurays. Due to scheduling conflicts, many extension offices will no longer accept walk-in appointments to watch these Blu-rays but do offer scheduled dates and times to provide this training.

If you can't attend training during one of the scheduled reshow dates at your county extension office, you will be charged a \$10 fee to view the training at your convenience. If attending the workshops or watching the three-hour Blu-rays is not convenient, commercial applicators may contact their local Department of Natural Resources field office to schedule an appointment to take the certification exam. Another option for commercial manure applicators is to take their training online at DNR MAC eLearning site at https://elearning-dnr.iowa.gov/. The applicator will need to sign in and get an A&A account.

In addition to the commercial manure applicator training offered on Jan. 6, ISU Extension and Outreach will also offer six dry/solid manure workshops for commercial manure applicators in February 2022. Information regarding these workshops and locations is also contained in the link to the brochure listed above. Program requirements are the same as the regular commercial training program, but this training program is geared more toward dry/solid manure issues.

Dry Manure Applicator Certification Workshops Offered in 2022

Iowa State University Extension and Outreach, in cooperation with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, will offer manure applicator certification workshops for dry/solid manure operators on six different dates and locations in February 2022. These workshops meet manure applicator certification requirements for both confinement site manure applicators and commercial manure applicators who primarily apply dry or solid manure.

"The information in this workshop will benefit not only those needing certification, but anyone using dry or solid sources of manure as a nutrient resource," said Dan Andersen, associate professor of agricultural and biosystems engineering and extension agriculture engineering specialist at Iowa State, and coordinator of the manure applicator certification program.

The workshops are free to attend and open to all. Applicators will be required to submit certification forms and fees to the Iowa Department of Natural Resources to meet manure applicator certification requirements.

Pre-registration is required. No walk-ins are allowed. Please register for one of the workshops by calling the number listed with the selected site. All workshops begin at 1 p.m.

Children, the Holiday Season and Temperament

The holiday season brings plenty of changes, festivities and time at home for children. How they handle it all is affected by their temperament, says Mackenzie DeJong, a human sciences specialist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

Temperament, originally studied by psychologists Alexander Thomas and Stella Chess, determines how individuals fall on a continuum for each of nine traits.

"Parents, caregivers, friends and family members can use temperament to predict how a child will act in a situation and plan accordingly," said DeJong, who specializes in family wellbeing.

So how might the different traits play out in winter holiday settings? DeJong offers the following examples.

Children with a high activity level are restless when quiet activities are expected for a long period of time. They are also likely the ones roaming around the house, while the child with a low activity level is happy cuddling up on the couch with some hot cocoa, a blanket and a favorite movie on TV.

Less adaptable children have trouble changing from their usual school schedule to the break schedule with holiday activities. The adaptable child is probably excited for the change and for the hubbub that comes with it.

When entering family holiday events, the withdrawing child might take time to warm up to the situation rather than feeling comfortable hugging their great-aunt who they haven't seen in a while. The approaching child might be the one who runs off and is sledding at the snow hill with a family they don't even know.

A highly distractible child may be noticing every conversation, interaction and smirk the adults make at a family gathering, while the less distractible child is able to tune out all the adult interactions and play alone.

Will you know whether your intense child likes a gift? Absolutely. This child might shout and jump up and down when opening a gift. The less intense child might love the present just as much but express it much more quietly. This child may open each present without more than a "thank you" and a smile.

"Holiday joy!" might be the motto of your high mood child, who may have been insisting to put up the festive decorations back in October. Lower mood children, even if grateful for the holiday season and all it brings, might not show it on their face.

The persistent child may be happy to play one game or with one toy for quite a long while, even if the group is ready to move on. Less persistent children might have never quite finished the chore you asked them to get done before everyone came over.

Your child's regularity will be affected by all the schedule changes as well. A less regular child typically gets hungry, sleeps and goes to the bathroom at unpredictable times,

while a regular child can be more predictable and often operates on a schedule. During the holidays, a few questions that might come are "Will they be hungry at dinner time? Will they need to go to the bathroom right after you get out of town? Will they be so exhausted from all the excitement that they can barely stay awake during gift opening?"

A sensitive child could feel overwhelmed by the new sights, unfamiliar smells and loud noises at a gathering. The added stimulation could make these children more irritable, or they may simply need more breaks. Less sensitive children might not remember to go to the bathroom because they were so busy playing with their cousins they forgot to check in on their bodily cues. Weather wise, the sensitive child may get cold quickly and will opt to stay inside, while the less sensitive child thinks "the cold never bothered me anyway" and runs outside to play for hours.

"As you can see, temperament plays a part in how so many holiday scenarios may go. The key is to start to understand your child's temperament and plan accordingly," DeJong said.

For more information relating to temperament, check out The Science of Parenting podcast, available on Facebook, the blog site (www.scienceofparenting.org) and anywhere you can listen to podcasts. So far two seasons have discussed temperament: season 2 provided a general overview of temperament, and season 7 looked at an intersection of temperament and child development. Season 7 wrapped in November and new season on guidance and discipline 10 begins in February 2022.
