# Harvest Season Safety

Many farmers are working hard to prepare for the upcoming harvest season. Getting ready for this busy time probably involves tuning up the combine. It should also include reviewing best safety practices with everyone involved in your operation. Taking time to plan for an emergency situation can have a huge impact on the outcome of an emergency on your farm, and possibly save lives. Included below are tips to help keep everyone safe this fall.

- Keeping yourself safe. Harvest season tends to bring early mornings and late nights. Running equipment fatigued puts you and others at increased risk of injury. Do your best to prioritize rest. Along with rest, keeping your body fueled and hydrated will also help you to function better. I suggest packing extra snacks and water to have throughout the day and trying your best to not skip meals. Dressing properly can also help keep you safe. Close toed shoes with good grip and long pants are recommended. Avoid wearing baggy clothing that can get caught in equipment. Sunscreen and noise protection earmuffs are also good things to have along.
- Running Equipment. Many pieces of equipment that will

be used this fall are only used once a year. Reviewing manuals before operating equipment can help familiarize yourself with the machine before running it in the field. If other people are helping on your operation during harvest time they should be trained on the equipment before the season begins. Inexperience with equipment can be dangerous for everyone involved. Extra hands to help during harvest time is great but can bring risks as well. I recommend everyone wears bright colors when working on the farm to keep people more visible. Educate children about safety around farm equipment. Designate a safe play area, and always check around and below equipment before moving.

Awareness while traveling. Keeping the roads safe during the fall is a job for everyone on the roads. Farmers can do their job by keeping 'Slow Moving Vehicle' emblems bright and clean and ensuring all lights on the equipment work. Farmers should also try to avoid busy roads and traveling during dusk, dawn and busy commute times. Motorists should be prepared during this harvest season to slow down when coming up on farm equipment. Don't assume the farmer can move aside to let you pass. Shoulders may be soft, wet, or steep, which can cause the farm vehicle to tip. Never pass in a no-passing zone, and when you're clear to pass, always use your turn signals. Make sure you can see the farm vehicle in your rear-view mirror before you get back in your lane. Both farmers and motorists should stay off electronics while operating vehicles.

I encourage you to slow down this harvest season and prioritize safety. Getting everyone home at night is the most important task of the day. Wishing everyone a safe and plentiful harvest season!



# Relationships Can Heal: Knowing the Farmer Client Training Offered in Dubuque and Fort Dodge for Healthcare, Mental Health Professionals

Even in good times, farmers face a unique set of challenges when it comes to rural stress and mental health. Professionals working in the healthcare or mental health fields may not be aware of or understand these unique challenges, said David Brown, behavioral health state specialist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

Because of this, ISU Extension and Outreach is hosting two inperson "Relationships Can Heal: Knowing the Farmer Client" programs this fall. This training for healthcare and mental health professionals will help them learn more about the culture, identity, occupation and well-being of farm and ranch producers. These professionals will also learn more about the challenges and barriers that farmers and ranchers face in seeking care.

The first class will be held at the ISU Extension and Outreach Dubuque County office at 14858 West Ridge Lane, Suite 2 in Dubuque on Thursday, Oct. 17. Those interested can register online at https://go.iastate.edu/IG0I5M. The class will start at 8:30 a.m. and will end at 4 p.m.

The second class will be held at the ISU Extension and Outreach Webster County office at 822 Central Ave., Suite 102 in Fort Dodge on Thursday, Oct.24. Those interested can register online at https://go.iastate.edu/NSES3T. The class will start at 8:30 a.m. and will end at 4 p.m.

Both classes are offered at no cost due to a USDA NIFA grant funded through the North Central Farm and Ranch Stress Assistance Center at the University of Illinois. This program has been approved for 6.25 continuing education hours through the National Board for Certified Counselors.

The presenters for both classes will include David Brown, behavioral

health state specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach; Tim Christensen, farm management specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach; and Rich Gassman, director of Iowa's Center for Agricultural Safety and Health at the University of Iowa.

# Iowa Dairy Industry Doubleheader Set for November 1-2

Receive updates on cuttingedge topics in dairy management

Iowa dairy professionals, farmers and industry stakeholders are invited to join a unique two-day event this fall. The Iowa Dairy Industry Doubleheader will take place on Friday, Nov. 1, and Saturday, Nov. 2, featuring a professional development workshop and a social networking tailgate co-hosted by the Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Dairy Team and the Dairy Science Club at Iowa State University.

On Friday, Nov. 1, the event kicks off at the Iowa Veterinary Medical Association headquarters in Ankeny, with an afternoon session titled "Professional Development for Iowa Dairy Industry Consultants." Beginning at 1:30 p.m., the program will offer hands-on learning opportunities and presentations from expert speakers on cutting-edge topics in dairy management. Space is limited, ensuring a highly interactive learning experience.

"The program will provide three hours of meaningful Continuing Education credits approved by both the Iowa Board of Veterinary Medicine and the American Registry of Professional Animal Scientists," said Dr. Phillip Jardon, state dairy

extension veterinarian. "The topics (experiences with automatic calf feeders, HPAI and biosecurity) were chosen as important current topics to animal dairy producers, nutritionists, veterinarians and other industry consultants."

Following the workshop, attendees are invited to a social hour, sponsored by Elanco Animal Health, providing additional time for informal networking and discussion.

On Saturday, Nov. 2, the event moves to Jack Trice Stadium in Ames for the Iowa Dairy Industry Tailgate, a fun and casual gathering for students, faculty, industry professionals, farmers and alumni. The tailgate will be held before the Iowa State Cyclones football game, with food, refreshments and plenty of time to connect and network. The Iowa State Dairy Science Club will also be hosting its annual alumni reunion as part of this event. This event is sponsored by the Iowa State Dairy Association.
