

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Planter University Workshops Focus on Optimizing Planter Setup across All Brands

Workshops to be held in six locations across Iowa

Specialists with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach are once again teaming up with Iowa State Ag and Biosystems Engineering specialists to bring planter equipment expertise to farms across the state. Planter University workshops are set for Feb. 3-7 and 11, 2025.

The workshops are an opportunity for farmers, agricultural service providers, equipment and precision ag dealers, and others to gain insight into how planters function; how to optimize settings for individual seed, field and equipment needs; and improve understanding of planter wear and calibration.

"Planter University goes far beyond a typical planter clinic and provides attendees direct access to specialists with expertise in planter technology and settings," said Meaghan Anderson, field agronomist with ISU Extension and Outreach. "We are excited to host these workshops across the state again this February."

Specialists from the Iowa State Digital Ag group will lead each workshop and focus on small-group, hands-on learning with row units representing a variety of technologies currently available for planters. The Digital Ag group is renowned for its key industry partnerships and unique expertise in equipment development and precision agriculture. Meetings will also offer continuing education credits for Certified Crop Advisers.

"Former participants overwhelmingly enjoyed the workshop approach and stated the workshop improved their ability to confidently make adjustments during planting season," said Levi Powell, Iowa State ag and biosystems engineering program specialist.

"We are going to help attendees better understand the physics behind traditional and high-speed planters and how to evaluate planting performance, because every planter, operator and operation is different. This event will focus on how to dial in the right settings for you and your operation," added Ben Covington, Iowa State ag and biosystems engineering program specialist.

The training will be offered at six locations. Attendance will be limited to maintain small group sizes and allow for hands-on activities. Registration for each location is \$100 and closes seven days ahead of each meeting. There is no on-site registration available. Register online starting Jan. 2, 2025.

January 2025 Annie's Project Provides Agriculture Business Education to Iowa Farm Women

Annie's Project, a six-week course designed to help farm women develop their management and decision-making skills, is being offered by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Webster County. Online registration is available at www.aep.iastate.edu/womeninag. Classes will be held at the Webster County Extension Office, 822 Central Ave., Fort Dodge, on Thursdays from 6 p.m. – 9 p.m. beginning February 6 and continuing February 13, 20, 27 and March 6 and 13. A light meal will be provided at 5:30 p.m. The cost is \$100.00.

Farm women participating in Annie's Project courses become better business partners and owners by learning to manage and organize critical information for their own farms, while establishing networks with other farm women and agriculture business professionals.

According to ISU Extension and Outreach farm specialist, Alexis Stevens, Annie's Project covers five areas of agricultural risk management: financial, human resources, legal, marketing and production.

"Our goal is to provide a program that is of great interest and value. Each session includes presentations, discussions, hands-on activities and computer skills training," says Stevens. "In addition, guest speakers share their personal experiences and knowledge to help women become better business partners and owners," Stevens adds.

Annie's Project is a national program reaching 38 states. The mission of Annie's Project is to empower women in agriculture to be successful though education, networks and resources. Annie's Project celebrated 20 years of inspiring women in agriculture in 2023. The program was developed to help women like Annie achieve their agricultural goals.

In Iowa, 2,137 women have benefited from 124 Annie's Project courses and 1,317 women have benefited from 97 Annie's Inspired courses. Annie's Inspired courses grew out of the requests for additional information from women participating in Annie's Project. The extension farm management team, county extension professionals and others in the state work together to host local multi-session programs focused on agricultural risk management.

"Offering a quality program such as Annie's Project is of great benefit to our community and we are excited to offer this program," says Linda Cline, Webster County Program Coordinator.

"Annie's Project empowers women by offering a valuable set of business-based workshops. The program helps participants learn ways to make better financial and risk management decisions," according to Madeline Schultz, ISU Extension and Outreach Women in Agriculture Program Manager.

According to post-program surveys, participants have reported that the program encouraged learning and that the nurturing environment has facilitated ongoing conversation with local speakers. In addition, respondents were able to network with other professionals and stated that they felt comfortable interacting with others for additional information and assistance. Overall, participants remarked that the courses were beneficial in understanding the factors in farming that pertain to women, their families, and the land. He has spent two stints in South Dakota, first completing his M.S. at the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology and most recently as Associate Professor and State Climatologist for South Dakota at South Dakota State University. He is well known regionally as a speaker and media source on various climate issues and is the former president of the American Association of State Climatologists.

Registration Now Open for 2025-2026 SowBridge Educational Series

SowBridge, the distance educational series for those who work with sows, boars, and piglets, and with genetic and reproductive issues, begins its next program year in early February 2025, and registration is now underway. The series is provided online through the Zoom platform and each session is recorded for later viewing.

Sherry Hoyer, communication specialist with the Iowa Pork Industry Center at Iowa State University, said suggestions from participants guide the selection of future topics and speakers, and the opportunity for interaction with session speakers will not change.

"SowBridge provides all participants with the opportunity to hear directly from experts, and to contact those experts following the individual sessions," she said.

Sessions generally are held on the first Wednesday of the month and run from 11:15 a.m. to about 12:15 p.m. Central Time. One exception this year: the fifth session is moved up one week to May 28 to avoid conflicts with World Pork Expo.

During each session, participants can ask questions of the industry expert presenter from the comfort of their home, office, or swine unit. Each registration provides access to one Zoom connection per session and all program materials provided by presenters.

The cost is \$200 (\$U.S.) for the first registration and half that amount for each subsequent registration from the same entity.

Registration is due Jan. 20, 2025, to ensure participants have access to materials for the first session on Feb. 5. A flyer with information and registration form is available on the IPIC website.

Updated Data for Decision Makers Reports Released for Iowa's State, Counties and Cities

Iowa State University Extension and Outreach has released updated Data for Decision Makers reports for the state, counties and cities. Based on data from the American Community Survey for 2019 to 2023, the reports offer detailed insights into household and family income, educational attainment, housing values, rental costs, occupation, employment and poverty measures.

The DDMs are intended to help policymakers and community leaders analyze current conditions, allocate resources and develop policies tailored to local needs.

"These updates ensure that communities are working with the most current and reliable data available," said Sandra Burke, a sociologist and research scientist with ISU Extension and Outreach. "Annual updates like this allow decision makers to track changes over time and adjust their strategies accordingly."

"These reports make it possible for communities to identify and address pressing issues," Burke said. "For instance, if housing values and rental costs are rising faster than household incomes, leaders can use that data to prioritize affordable housing initiatives or apply for grants to assist low-income residents. Similarly, income and education data can help local officials understand where economic disparities exist and focus resources where they are most needed.

"Overall, these reports give community leaders the tools they need to understand their current situation and compare it to neighboring communities, counties, the state or U.S. averages. This kind of information is key for identifying strengths, addressing challenges and planning for the future. By understanding how their community compares to others, leaders can prioritize investments in housing or apply for grants to fill gaps," Burke said.

Set Goal to Care for Yourself with Powerful Tools for Caregivers

With the beginning of a new year, many Iowans make resolutions to achieve their goals. However, Iowans who serve as caregivers for others may have difficulty setting goals for themselves, says Barbara Dunn Swanson, a human sciences specialist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach. "Effective caregiving requires that caregivers prioritize their health and wellbeing first, to provide adequate care to their care recipients," said Dunn Swanson, who specializes in family wellbeing.

Iowans who would like to take better care of themselves as they provide care for others are encouraged to participate in Powerful Tools for Caregivers, a series of classes offered virtually by ISU Extension and Outreach. The next six-week, online series begins Monday, Feb. 3, 1–2:30 p.m. The registration fee is \$40 and includes a caregiver help book. Online registration is now open.

"Invest in your own understanding of caregiving by participating in the Powerful Tools for Caregivers series," Dunn Swanson said. Research shows Powerful Tools for Caregivers classes help caregivers improve self-care behaviors including increased exercise, relaxation and medical check-ups.

"You'll learn about managing your emotions to reduce feelings of guilt, anger or depression. You'll also build self-confidence in coping with caregiving demands while developing assertive communication skills," Dunn Swanson continued.

"In addition, you'll learn about local community resources and services that can help caregivers," Dunn Swanson said.

Dunn Swanson offered the following strategies for caregivers who may need encouragement as they begin a new year:

- Prioritize self-care by taking time for yourself, even if just a few minutes a day. Your wellbeing is a priority.
- Set realistic goals. Break larger tasks into smaller, achievable goals. Celebrate small victories to stay motivated.
- Create a routine. Establish a consistent daily routine for both you and the person you care for. This can provide a sense of stability and predictability.
- Delegate tasks. Don't be afraid to ask for help. Friends, family or professional caregivers can share the load.
- Join a support group. Connecting with other caregivers can provide emotional support and practical advice.
