"My Name is Betty Ford" Program



On April 12, 2025, Diana Star Helmer portrayed First Lady Betty Ford at the Rialto Theatre in Pocahontas. In a stage setting for year 1981, Betty Ford describes to a crowd an intervention by her doctors, family, and close friends after the White House years. This event was followed by treatment at the Long Beach Naval Hospital for her addiction to pills and alcohol. Later, she helped to establish the Betty Ford Center in Rancho Mirage, CA, for both men and women. Betty Ford and her husband were in the nation's capitol for a total of 28 years, including Jerry Ford's service as a Michigan Congressman and Minority Leader. As First Lady of the United States from August of 1974 to January of 1977, Betty Ford was often a public speaker. Further, she brought awareness to breast cancer, and she was outspoken in promoting equality for women. In 1976, she gave her husband's concession speech to Jimmy Carter after President Jerry Ford lost his voice.

Iowa 4-H Launches New Statewide Fishing Club

Iowa 4-H is launching a new statewide fishing club, designed for Iowa youth in grades 4-12. This immersive program aims to deepen participants' understanding of aquatic life found in Iowa, focusing on topics like identifying common fish species, mastering safe catch-and-release techniques and learning the intricate art of lure tying.

"This program focuses on educating members about Iowa's aquatic ecosystems, improving fishing techniques and promoting environmental stewardship," said Angie Dougherty, 4-H youth program specialist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

The program is structured into three parts: kick-off webinars, tournaments and fishing skills webinars. Each is designed to enhance members' fishing skills and deepen their connection to Iowa's waterways.

Enrollment for the club is now open, and club opportunities will start April 28. To join, participants must first enroll as a 4-H member in 4-H Online in their county's Statewide Fishing Club.

"After you've become a 4-H member in your county, you will be notified to enroll in the Iowa 4-H Fishing Club event," Dougherty explained.

Tournament Kick-off webinars.

Club activities begin with Tournament Kick-off webinars, which will be held a few days before each of three tournaments opens. These informational sessions will feature expert guest speakers who will share valuable insights about various fish species, their environments, and the best tackle and techniques for successful fishing. This introduction aims to prepare and excite members for the upcoming months of competition.

Three months of tournaments. Following the webinars, the program transitions into three months of tournaments. Each month focuses on a different species, presenting youth with the challenge of catching the longest fish. The competition is strictly based on catches made within Iowa's state lines during the designated month, and prizes for the longest catch will be awarded. This year's inaugural tournaments will feature trout, bluegill and catfish species.

To be eligible for prizes, register before the start of the tournament dates. The first tournament, trout, begins May 1. The final tournament is catfish and opens July 1. More information on webinar and tournament dates is available online.

Fishing Skills webinar series. The final part of the program is the Fishing Skills webinar series. This online series will feature a variety of essential fishing techniques, with expert-led demonstrations on crafting slip bobbers (with all materials provided), filleting fish, preparing them for delicious meals, and much more.

Guest speakers this summer will include a wildlife officer who navigates and patrols the Mississippi River and will discuss Iowa's water systems in addition to safety practices; a wildlife biologist with the Iowa DNR; and a retired conservation officer and current commercial fisherman who will show tricks of the trade for cleaning and cooking fish.

"By fostering youth-to-adult partnerships through virtual education, we will connect young enthusiasts with experts and community partners from across the state, creating a dynamic learning environment that encourages long-term engagement and excitement in their special interest," said Katie Peterson, 4-H youth program specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach.

Through hands-on activities, webinars and self-led tournaments, members will gain skills in fishing, fish identification, lure tying, water safety and more. Most important, this experience will foster a connection with the great outdoors, encouraging participants to appreciate and engage with Iowa's natural beauty while developing valuable life skills such as responsibility, perseverance and critical thinking as 4-H members.

"Whether you're looking to become a skilled angler or just want to try a new outdoor hobby, this program will enhance your connection to nature and foster a lifelong passion for fishing," said Dougherty. "By bridging the gap between recreational fishing and 4-H's broader educational goals, the statewide fishing club serves as a valuable tool for expanding community involvement and fostering a sense of unity and purpose."

Staff are looking to collaborate with local fishing experts and community organizations to enhance fishing involvement at the county level. Those interested in partnering with Iowa 4-H to share their expertise and engage youth in fishing opportunities are encouraged to connect with Peterson and Dougherty.

"We are eager to collaborate and bring more youth to Iowa 4-H through fishing," Peterson said.

The Iowa 4-H Foundation is providing funding for the Statewide Fishing Club.

Agronomy Workshop Series for Women to Be Held in Franklin County

Iowa State University Extension and Outreach will host Agronomy in the Field, a multi-session, hands-on workshop being offered to women landowners, farmers, conservationists, and other women who are interested in learning more about agronomy. The workshop series will be held during the 2025 growing season.

Sessions are designed to be hands-on and conducted in the field to see real-time conditions.

"Agronomy in the Field aims to strengthen agronomic skills for women that allow for better decision-making, provide a better understanding of inputs for crop production, showcase various conservation practices and increase confidence in communication with farming partners," said Angela Rieck-Hinz, north central field agronomist for Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

The workshops will be held on April 29, May 27, June 24, July 22, Aug. 26 and Sept. 9 from 5:30 to 7:00 p.m. at a farm located east of Hampton. Specific session and location details will be emailed to registrants.

The fee to register is \$50, with a discounted rate of \$30 for high school or college students. This fee includes all educational materials and resources. Iowa Master Conservationist Program to begin in Hamilton, Webster, Pocahontas and Humboldt Counties

Iowa State University Extension and Outreach will offer the Iowa Master Conservationist Program starting May 6. The program will take place at different locations within Hamilton, Humboldt, Webster and Pocahontas Counties, providing participants with hands-on interaction showing the diversity of the state's natural resources. The program teaches about Iowa's natural ecosystems and the diversity of conservation challenges and opportunities within the region. Graduates of the course learn to make informed choices for leading and educating others to improve conservation in Iowa.

The program consists of approximately 12 hours of online curriculum and seven weekly three-hour face-to-face meetings. The online modules will include lessons and resources by Iowa State University subject-matter experts to be reviewed at the participants' own pace at home or at the ISU Extension and Outreach County office. Module topics include conservation history and science, understanding Iowa ecosystems, implementing conservation practices in human dominated landscapes and developing skills to help educate others about conservation practices.

The face-to-face meetings held on Tuesday evenings will build on the online lessons. The program schedule is as follows:

- May 6 Introduction Matt Cosgrove River's Edge Discovery Center, Fort Dodge
- May 13 Putting it together in the Watershed Webster City
- May 20 Understanding Iowa's Ecosystems: Prairies Brushy Creek
- May 27 Understanding Iowa's Ecosystems: Forests Gotch Park, Humboldt
- June 3 Understanding Iowa's Ecosystems: Aquatic Environments, Smeltzer Farm, Webster
- June 10 Setting the Stage: Land, Water and Conservation in Iowa, Humboldt/Pocahontas Co
- June 17 Planting the seeds of Conservation: Graduation, Coopers Cove, Pocahontas County

All programs are from 6-9 p.m. Each face-to-face meeting will be led by local subject-matter experts to demonstrate how the principles covered in the online curriculum play out locally.

Workshops Offered by The Science of Parenting

Research conducted by Zero to Three (2016), found that parents need and want information and support. 80% of parents work to be better parents, and 69% of parents say if they knew more parenting strategies, they would use them. Despite this motivation, however, almost half of parents say they aren't getting the support they need during times of stress.

The Science of Parenting team from Iowa State University has scheduled virtual workshops to help caregivers learn about various parenting strategies. These workshops all focus on sharing research-based information that fits each family's own reality.

Understanding Research and Reality – June 4th 12:00pm How do parents use research to help inform their unique parenting reality? Learn about how parenting realities are different and discover helpful parenting tools and techniques. This workshop is approved for foster parent credit hours.

Understanding Temperament – June 11th 12:00pm Every child is unique, and individual temperament is one of the biggest reasons why! This workshop will introduce the individual temperament traits and explore how your child's temperament can impact their feelings and behaviors.

Children's Ages and Parenting Stages – June 18th 12:00pm As kids grow through different ages, parents also go through stages! Learn about those stages, development, and tips for adapting your parenting to your child's age and abilities.

Positive Discipline – June 25th 12:00pm Parents often cite guidance and discipline as their number one concern. Learn to see positive discipline as an opportunity to build positive parent-child relationships. This workshop is approved for foster parent credit hours.

Register for the 2025 Crop Scouting Competition by July 1

Youth teams can now register for the 2025 Youth Crop Scouting Competition, hosted by Iowa 4-H and the Iowa State University Integrated Pest Management program. The event will be held July 24 at Wyffels Hybrids in Ames.

Middle and high school students in grades 7-12 are invited to put their crop scouting skills to the test, competing against other youth teams across the state. The event aims to bring awareness of IPM in Iowa and allow youth to learn IPM basics through hands-on learning and teamwork.

"Teams prepare in advance of the competition, working together to learn about pest identification, crop management and crop scouting," said Maya Hayslett, crop science youth education specialist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach and program coordinator for the Iowa Youth Crop Scouting Competition. "The competition is then a chance for them to use their critical thinking and teamwork skills to assess field conditions and consider management options."

At the event, teams rotate between different crop plots where they are evaluated on their knowledge and skills in crop scouting by answering questions and demonstrating field skills as asked by station judges. Stations are run by ISU faculty and staff and agriculture industry professionals, allowing students to work next to and learn from experts.

"The competition is a chance for them to see several different career paths related to agronomy," Hayslett said.

One of the youth participants said, "I enjoyed getting to work and interact with industry professionals and gain insight into how they identify and solve problems."

Potential topics include crop diseases, insects, disorders, weed identification, crop growth stages, cover crops, sprayer calibration and pesticide use. In addition to the competition, youth have a lunch from Hickory Park and participate in fun activities with youth from around the state. After the competition, participants can visit the Iowa State University agronomy and agricultural and biosystems engineering departments to learn about their program offerings.

Based on points accrued from the field station evaluations, the top four teams are eligible to win cash prizes. The top two teams will advance to the regional competition to compete against teams from seven states this September.
