Our Evening Tot Time will be starting up again next week! This year it will be the first and third Mondays of each month at 5:30 p.m. This is geared to our littlest library patrons, with music, books, a craft, and of course bubbles. Older siblings are encouraged to attend because we always need helpers and good role models for the littles. Also we just can't imagine Tot Times without some of these kids who have been coming since they were babies!

If you heard a big loud "Whoop!" the other day, it was probably me when I hit the "submit" button on our Annual Survey that we submit to the State Library of Iowa. This year the survey was 23 pages long, and included 224 questions. Some of these questions include how many copies we've added and how many we've weeded in each of our sections; Number of programs & how many attendees; Questions about our income and expenditures; Questions about how many items were checked out in different categories. When it came time to total the number of circulations of physical items, the answer was 32,167. This was automatically flagged by the survey, and I was alarmed, so I read the reason for the flag, "The ratio of Physical Item Circulation to Population of Legal Service Area is less than 0.45 or greater than 15.72. Please check for errors or provide an explanation." Well, I did the math again and my answer was correct. Then I figured our ratio with our City population of 1264 – it's 25.45! We were flagged because we exceeded their expectations by quite a bit! I had to provide an explanation before I could continue, so I wrote, "I guess we're just awesome like that!" They seemed to accept that fact and it went smoothly after that.

We received our first Christmas novel of the year! It's *Once Upon a Christmas Carol* by Melody Carlson. We also received *The Surrogate Mother* by Freda McFadden and *The End of the World As We Know It: New Tales of Stephen King's The Stand* by Christopher Golden. Another interesting one is the kids picture book *Hansel and Gretel* by Stephen King and Maurice Sendak. With that combination it sounded so unique, I ordered this book when it was first announced, back in February and have been anxiously awaiting its release!

September is Banned Books awareness month, so naturally we had to make our selection from a list of most frequently banned and challenged books. We chose *Stamped: Racism, Antiracism, and You* by Jason Reynolds. This book takes you on that journey, showing how racist ideas started and were spread, and how they can be discredited. It has often been challenged, ostensibly for vulgar language and discussions of race. I bet we will have an interesting discussion!

I-29 Moo University Webinar on September 16 to Manure Scoring to See How Cows Are Working with Their Diets

The I-29 Moo University Dairy Webinar Series continues Tuesday, September 16 from 12 noon to 1 p.m. CDT, focusing on manure scoring with Dr. Mary Beth Hall.

Dr. Hall, owner of The Cows Are Always Right dairy consulting business, she counsels with producers to improve feeding and profitability. She was formerly with the USDA-ARS U.S. Dairy Forage Research Center in Wisconsin.

Her program on Tuesday, September 16, "Manure Evaluation for Reading Your Cows: It Doesn't Just Happen" will focus on what we see when we walk herds, we see manure. Did you ever consider that the way manure looks and what is in it could tell you about how the cows are working with their diets? In this presentation She'll discuss how rumen and gut function can change manure characteristics, what those changes look like, and how evaluation of manure, feeds, diets, cow performance, and management can be brought together to look for ways to improve herd performance.

Four-State Dairy Nutrition & Management Conference September Webinar Will Focus On Mycotoxin Mitigation

The Four-State Dairy Nutrition & Management Conference webinar series continue on Thursday, September 18 will feature Dr. Joe Pankowski discussing his new approach to mycotoxin mitigation.

Dr. Joel Pankowski's presentation "Mycotoxin Mitigation: A New Approach" describes Mycotoxins can be formed on crops in the field, during harvest, or during storage, processing, or feeding. In a global survey, 85% of cereal grains sampled were contaminated with at least one mycotoxin. The threat of mycotoxins also exists in silage. Ruminants are susceptible to the detrimental effects of mycotoxins in the diet, meaning that your herd's production and performance -- and, ultimately, your profitability -- could be taking a hit.

Ingested mycotoxins can damage the gut epithelial cell surface, compromising a cow's ability to block mycotoxins from entering its tissues and migrating to different organs. What if you could combat the constant mycotoxin challenge from the inside out, building resilience and consistently meeting milk production goals?

He will review and discuss research-proven concepts. Attendees will have a better understanding of how their mycotoxin mitigation options can be objectively evaluated and implemented. This process will aid in the identification of research-proven and field-tested opportunities to maximize herd profitability.

Dr. Joel Pankowski joined the Arm and Hammer Technical Services Team in 2011. Currently, he leads and manages a team of Ph.D. and DVM Multi-Species Technical Service Managers that provide technical expertise to the Field Sales Team, Key Influencers and Producers in the Americas.

Joel received both his BS and MS degrees from The Ohio State University and then went on to earn his Ph.D. in Dairy Management from Cornell University. His areas of expertise are reproductive management and health, quantitative dairy herd data analysis, transition cow management and fatty acid nutrition.

His 30+ year career has included a variety of technical and leadership roles with the Monsanto Dairy Business, CPG Nutrients, AGWAY, Inc., Land 'O Lakes Purina Feed, and Alpharma Animal Health. Joel resides in Baldwinsville, NY with his wife, Tracy, and they have three grown children (Stacy, AJ and Trevor).

New Workshop on Oct. 9 Helps Iowans Apply Community Data to Guide Local Decisions

In a time when local budgets are tight and needs are growing, Iowa leaders are looking for new ways to guide decisions about housing, education and health care. A new virtual workshop from Iowa State University Extension and Outreach aims to give them just that, through data.

Demographics in Your Community is an interactive workshop set for Thursday, Oct. 9, from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. This new workshop is designed for community members, nonprofit leaders, city staff and others interested in using data to better understand and serve their communities.

"This workshop is about making data approachable," said Himar Hernández, assistant program director and community development specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach. "It's not just charts and numbers. It's about learning what those numbers say about your community, and how you can act on them."

Participants will walk through demographic reports specific to their town and county and explore topics like population shifts, income trends and housing needs. Case studies will tie those numbers to local planning, helping participants see how data can inform decisions about public services, grant applications and long-term strategy.

"It's easy to overlook data as something for experts," Hernández said. "But we've seen that once people see how it connects to their own lives, like where a new school should go or what services an aging population needs, they start using it in powerful ways."

The Demographics in Your Community session is one of five new leadership-focused workshops developed by ISU Extension and Outreach's Community and Economic Development unit in response to the growing pressures faced by Iowa's local leaders.

"Local leaders across Iowa are carrying more responsibility than ever, often with fewer resources and rising expectations," Hernández said. "These workshops, which focus on things like leading through disagreement, running more effective meetings and using AI responsibly, were built to help them meet that challenge, with tools they can use right away."

New Iowa Pork Industry Center Publication Focuses on Conjunctivitis Causes, Treatment, Control

Conjunctivitis (sometimes referred to as "pinkeye") in swine is characterized by inflammation of the conjunctival membranes of the eye. Causes can include common infectious pathogens and non-infectious avenues such as high levels of dust or ammonia, elevated hydrogen sulfide levels and allergenic bedding material.

A new publication from the Iowa Pork Industry Center, Conjunctivitis in Swine, has information on how to recognize the condition and what to do when it is detected in your animals. Iowa State University Extension and Outreach swine veterinarian Chris Rademacher, who is one of the authors, said many cases are observed during the late nursery to early grow-finish phase. Conjunctivitis also is a common complaint among producers, including those involved in swine exhibition opportunities.

"Both prevalence and severity in a group depend on the route of infection and transmission," he said. "For example, Chlamydia suis is a common agent, yet other viruses such as PRRS, Influenza A and pseudorabies should be ruled out with veterinarian assistance."

Non-infectious agents, including high levels of dust or ammonia, irritant bedding material and transport events (stressors), may also lead to conjunctivitis.

If conjunctivitis is detected in your animals, Rademacher said commercial and exhibition swine producers should assess the environmental conditions, take swab samples and work with their veterinarian on the next steps. Iowa State researchers are also looking for cases from which to collect swab samples as part of a study on which pathogens are most prevalent.
