Laurens Public Library to Receive \$10,000 Gift from Carnegie Corporation of New York

Laurens Public Library will receive a \$10,000 gift from Carnegie Corporation of New York, the foundation established by Andrew Carnegie. The award is part of Carnegie Libraries 250, a special initiative celebrating the upcoming 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence and honoring the roughly 1,280 Carnegie Libraries still serving their communities across the United States.

Scottish immigrant Andrew Carnegie funded the construction of 1,681 free public libraries nationwide between 1886 and 1917. Approximately 750 of them continue to use their original buildings, while others have moved to new locations. Opened in 1907, our library is one of 101 Carnegie Libraries in Iowa built through this historic program. A Carnegie gift of \$3,800

funded the construction of our library.

"Our founder, Andrew Carnegie, who championed the free public library movement of the late 19th century, described libraries as 'cradles of democracy' that 'strengthen the democratic idea, the equality of the citizen, and the royalty of man," said Dame Louise Richardson, president of Carnegie and former head of the University of Oxford. "We still believe this and are delighted to celebrate our connection to the libraries he founded."

The \$10,000 library gifts anchor a \$20 million special initiative created to celebrate next year's 250th anniversary by supporting America's civic institutions and organizations that foster civic participation and bring people together.

These grants include exchange programs between people in urban and rural areas, cultural events that reach new audiences, and activities that engage the next generation of Americans. Grantees

include Carnegie Hall, the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History, the Jack Miller Center for Teaching America's Founding Principles and History, the Museum of the City of New York, The New York

Historical, Yo-Yo Ma's Silkroad, and the Smithsonian Institution.

The special initiative aligns with the foundation's overarching goal of reducing political polarization. Over the past year, Carnegie has invested \$30 million in grants for civics education, statebased community service, youth voting, and media and digital literacy. Related grants include \$13 million to libraries for programs such as English language learning for adults and civic participation for teens. Carnegie also makes annual grants of \$6 million to fund the Andrew Carnegie Fellows Program and scholarly research about the causes of polarization and potential solutions to reduce it.

Laurens Public Library will receive the gift in January 2026, and we may use the funds however we wish to celebrate the 250th anniversary, further our mission, and benefit our community.

Good Nutrition on a Budget Program at Hope Church of Pocahontas County

Buying food is more expensive than ever! Learn ways to eat healthy while controlling the food budget. This class is offered on Monday, November 17, 2025, from 6:00 PM – 7:00 PM at the Hope Church of Pocahontas County. This program is supported by Pocahontas County Extension and Outreach.

"This program teaches four proven strategies to help people save money on food expenses," states Holly VanHeel, Health and Human Sciences Food and Health Educator and program presenter. "ISU Extension resources, including the Spend Smart. Eat Smart. website and phone app will also be explored."

According to the United Stated Department of Agriculture (USDA) Food Price Outlook for 2026, food prices are expected to grow more slowly in 2026 compared to historical averages, with an overall 2.7% increase for all food. Food-at-home (grocery store or supermarket food purchases) prices are predicted to increase 2.3 percent.

VanHeel states participants in the class will learn more about menu planning, unit pricing, cooking healthy recipes and even physical activity. "Participants will have fun practicing strategies, which they can start using right away to save money, eat healthy, and feel more in control of their food budget."

There is no fee for the program, but participants should register with Pocahontas County Extension and Outreach office at 712-335-3103.

No-Till and Soil Health Field Day to be Held near Badger on November 25

Iowa Learning Farms will host a no-till and soil health field day on Tuesday, Nov. 25, from noon to 2:00 p.m. at the Badger Community Center. The event is open to farmers and landowners at no cost and includes a complimentary meal.

Located in the heart of the Des Moines Lobe, known for the rich, dark soil, field day host Mark Thompson has been utilizing no-till on all soybean acres since 2002 and has made the transition to no-till corn in recent years. During the field day, Thompson will share his experiences adjusting machinery settings to handle the additional residue in a no-till system and timing of operations work best for his system.

"At first, it was an economics thing, then I found out that conservation, nutrient management and erosion control came along with it," said Thompson. "If you have never tried no-till, try some no-till beans. You will be shocked how well it works and how easy it is – just hesitate to do any tillage in the fall and plant right into the corn stalks."

Additionally, the field day will feature Angie Rieck-Hinz, ISU Extension and Outreach Field Agronomist, discussing residue management in a no-till system and Humboldt County farmer Doug Adams sharing his experiences with cover crops, no-till and strip-till and their benefits to soil health. Weather permitting, the event will also feature a field tour.

The field day will be held at the Badger Community Center, 211 1st Ave SE, Badger, IA 50516. The event and open to farmers and landowners, though reservations are required to ensure adequate space and food. The Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Dairy Team will host its annual Dairy Goat Management Seminar at two locations in December. The focus of this year's seminars is healthy herds and profitable practices for dairy goat producers.

The seminars are scheduled for Thursday, Dec. 4, from 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Historical Village Visitors Center in Kalona, located at 715 D Avenue. Additionally, there will be a seminar on Saturday, Dec. 6, from 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Sioux County Office in Orange City, which is located at 400 Central Avenue NW, Suite 700. A complimentary lunch will be provided thanks to sponsorship from Big Gain, Premier 1 Supplies and Saputo.

"Dairy goat production continues to be a vital part of Iowa's agricultural landscape," said Jenn Bentley, dairy field specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach. "We're excited to offer producers a well-rounded educational program focused on herd health, mastitis management, parasite control, record keeping and financial sustainability, delivered by a lineup of experienced presenters committed to providing practical strategies for success."
