Join us for our 2026 Leadership Series which is designed for both professional and personal growth. These sessions will focus on communication skills, team building, customer service and building stronger relationships at work and home. This three-part program will be held at Prairie Lakes AEA in Pocahontas, IA from 9am to 11am and cost \$25 per person per session. Registration deadline is February 20th.

1 March 13th | Communication

If you had to rate your communication skills on a scale of 1 to 10, what number would you give yourself? In this engaging, interactive session, we will explore simple strategies for increasing your effectiveness as a communicator, particularly at work. We'll cover key areas including consideration of your listeners' perspective; active listening skills; deductive vs. inductive communication; nonverbal communication; and when to use different modes of communication (email vs. phone). These strategies can be implemented to make you more skillful and effective when you communicate.

2 April 10th | Emotional Intelligence

How effective are you at relating to others? Do you have a good grasp on which personality types set you off? Can you remain calm in the face of annoyances? Decades of research on these types of Emotional Intelligence (EQ) skills have repeatedly demonstrated that people who have higher levels of Emotional Intelligence enjoy greater success and satisfaction at work, at home, and in their relationships. During this, interactive session, you will learn several user-friendly strategies for increasing your EQ. We'll start by introducing 25 key competencies of people with high levels of EQ, then work into strategies for improvement in Self Awareness; Self-Management; Social Awareness; and Relationship Management.

3 May 8th | Crucial Conversations

We've all been there—dreading an unavoidable difficult conversation. In a workplace, it might mean talking to a colleague who missed a critical deadline, confronting a team member about inappropriate behavior, or discussing issues that feel too "hot-button" to address. In this session, we will walk step-by-step through a framework for having those difficult conversations in ways that keep the conversation calm and productive. We'll start by helping participants understand their own natural styles of responding to difficult conversations, then work into learning specific strategies for conversing with others whose style may be very different from their own. These strategies can be easily applied to difficult conversations at both work and home.

ISU Extension and Outreach to Host 2026 Dairy Days Across Iowa

Iowa dairy producers and allied industry members are invited to attend 2026 Iowa Dairy Days, a statewide series of in-person educational meetings hosted by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach, this January and February. The 2026 theme, “Near-Term Strategies for Long-Term Pay-Off,” highlights practical, actionable decisions producers can make to strengthen herd performance, manage risk and support long-term profitability.

Dairy Days brings together regional and statewide extension specialists to address timely topics in milk markets, herd health, forage management and farm-level decision-making. Each location offers a full day of programming, interactive discussion and opportunities to network with fellow producers and industry partners. Lunch will be provided through local sponsorships.

“Many dairy producers are looking at predictions for 2026 milk prices and are getting nervous,” said Gail Carpenter, assistant professor and extension dairy specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach. “Our goal when developing this year’s program was to bring practical tools for dairy farmers who want to improve their management today to prepare for whatever the next year brings.”

The 2026 program features speakers from the ISU Extension and Outreach Dairy Team, as well as forage specialists:

Fred Hall, northwest Iowa dairy field specialist, will discuss current milk market dynamics and their implications for component-based pricing.

Dr. Phillip Jardon, clinical associate professor and dairy extension veterinarian, will review emerging disease and parasite issues and their implications for Iowa dairy herds.

Larry Tranel, northeast/southeast Iowa dairy field specialist, will explore cost-of-production strategies across herd sizes and production systems.

Shelby Gruss, assistant professor and extension forage specialist, will lead a forage identification session followed by a producer listening session.

Gail Carpenter will discuss how near-term culling decisions can influence long-term herd health, efficiency and profitability.

Jenn Bentley, northeast Iowa dairy field specialist, will share applied colostrum management strategies.

This program will be presented at five locations around the state. Additionally, the northwest Iowa location in Spencer will feature a tour of Jones Dairy beginning at 9 a.m. At all other locations, the program will begin at 9:30 a.m. with registration and refreshments, and speakers will begin at 10 a.m.

IPIC to offer three PQA Advisor Certification Sessions in 2026

The Iowa Pork Industry Center has announced the PQA Plus Advisor certification sessions for the 2026 year. With Pork Quality Assurance version 6.0 now in effect, training is required to maintain certification. IPIC associate director Chris Rademacher organizes PQA advisor certification sessions provided by IPIC.

“Advisors with an expired certification and people wanting to become certified for the first time are required to attend a face-to-face training like this,” he said. “Interested and qualified people should complete and return the application form soon.”

The sessions are scheduled to be on:

- Wednesday, January 28, 2026. This will be virtual via Zoom, and the application deadline will be Wednesday, January 21.
- Tuesday, July 7, 2026. This will be virtual via Zoom, and the application deadline will be Tuesday, June 30.
- Monday, October 5, 2026. This will be virtual via Zoom, and the application deadline will be September 28.

For all sessions, registration will start at 8:30 a.m. Central time and the session begins at 9 a.m.

Rademacher, who is also the Iowa State University extension swine veterinarian, leads the sessions and said it takes approximately six hours, including the exam at the end. No spot is guaranteed until the application is approved, and payment is accepted by IPIC. The cost is \$100 and includes all materials and lunch. Veterinary CEUs will be requested for the sessions.

Qualification requirements are listed on the two-page application form, available as both a fillable PDF document and a Word document from the PQA Page on the IPIC website. Applicants may use either version.

Garden Academy

The Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Master Gardener Program will provide its statewide horticulture training in the spring and fall of 2026. Garden Academy, previously known as Iowa Master Gardener training, offers a comprehensive approach to consumer horticulture education.

From the training, participants can expect:

- 10 weeks of asynchronous online instruction, featuring video lectures, reading assignments and quizzes
- A comprehensive overview of 17 horticultural topics to build a varied foundation of horticultural knowledge
- Additional resources for deeper exploration of specific interests
- Completion of a pre- and post-test to meet course requirements
- Three optional live interactive Zoom sessions with campus specialists

Interested participants can choose from two program tracks: Iowa Master Gardener Volunteer or Iowa Home Gardener. All participants, whether enrolled to become an Iowa Master Gardener Volunteer or an Iowa Home Gardener, will complete the same course designed to enhance horticulture knowledge and skills.

Alicia Herzog, Iowa Master Gardener program manager for ISU Extension and Outreach, explained the goals of both course tracks. "The Iowa Master Gardener Volunteer track is focused on developing and supporting passionate volunteers, providing them with knowledge and resources that instill confidence in them as they serve their communities. Participants do not have to be gardening experts to complete this option," she said. "The Iowa Home Gardener track is great for those looking to enhance their own knowledge and personal gardening skills."

Applications for the spring Iowa Master Gardener track will be open from Jan. 5 through Jan. 30 on the Iowa Master Gardener website. A list of participating counties is also available on the website.

Iowa Home Gardener participants will be able to purchase their spot in the course starting Feb. 2 on the ISU Extension Store website.

The spring training period for both tracks is Feb. 16 to April 24.

Garden Academy will be offered again in the fall from Aug. 31 to Nov. 6. Applications for the Iowa Master Gardener track will be accepted July 20 through Aug. 14. Iowa Home Gardener spots will go on sale Aug. 17.

Review the application and completion guidelines for both tracks below.

Iowa Master Gardener Volunteer Track

1. Submit an application and background check. Apply to be an Iowa Master Gardener Volunteer and successfully complete a background check by contacting an ISU Extension and Outreach county office.
2. Make a payment. Be accepted into the Iowa Master Gardener Volunteer track and pay a one-time Garden Academy fee to the ISU Extension and Outreach county office.
3. Complete training. Complete the 10-week online Garden Academy training and pass the final quiz.
4. Complete orientation. Attend in-person volunteer orientation through the ISU Extension and Outreach county office. Dates, times and duration vary by county. County Master Gardener Coordinators will provide county-specific information.
5. Volunteer in the community. Complete a 40-hour volunteer internship within one full calendar year. County Master Gardener Coordinators will provide county-specific information and guidance throughout the application, training and internship period.
6. Stay involved. After completing the volunteer internship, Iowa Master Gardener Volunteers remain active members by completing 10 hours of continuing education and contributing 20 hours of volunteer service annually. Volunteer and continuing education hours should be reported online by Dec. 1 of each year.

Iowa Home Gardener Track

1. Access course materials. Purchase access to the Garden Academy course through the ISU Extension Store.
2. Complete training. Complete the 10-week online Garden Academy training and pass the final quiz.
3. Go garden. Participants in this track will receive a certificate of completion as an Iowa Home Gardener but will not earn the title of Iowa Master Gardener.

'Boots in the Barn' Series Offered in Dallas County in February

Iowa State University Extension and Outreach will offer Boots in the Barn, an educational opportunity for central Iowa beef cattle producers, this February. Hosted by Dallas and Boone counties, the four-part meeting series has been set for 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Feb. 4, 11, 18 and 25 at the Towncraft Gallery, located at 1122 Willis Ave., Perry.

Chris Clark, extension beef specialist, said the program will include some interactive learning and hands-on activities.

"I hope to make it an interesting and interactive program with time for discussion and various interactive learning exercises," he said. "We plan to round out the program by using the dystocia model to learn about the birthing process and practice delivering calves."

Series topics will include animal health, nutrition, animal selection, managing the birthing process and more. Curriculum is flexible and can be adapted to meet the interests and needs of participants.

"I have some lessons in mind that we will almost certainly use, including some nutrition, animal health, animal selection and delivering a calf. Beyond that though, we have flexibility to tailor the program to the interests of the participants," Clark said.

An evening meal will be served at each meeting and online registration by Jan. 28 is requested to assist organizers with meal planning. The registration fee is \$50 and includes meals and resource manuals.

Registration Open for 2026-2027 SowBridge Educational Series

SowBridge, the distance educational series for those who work with sows, boars, and piglets and with genetic and reproductive issues, begins its next program year in early February 2026, and registration is now underway. The series is provided online through Zoom, and each session is recorded for later viewing.

Suggestions from participants guide the selection of future topics and speakers, and the opportunity for interaction with session speakers remains unchanged. SowBridge provides all participants with the opportunity to hear directly from experts and to contact those experts following the individual sessions.

Sessions generally are held on the first Wednesday of the month and run from 11:15 a.m. to about 12:15 p.m. Central time. The fifth session is moved up one week to May 27 to avoid conflicts with the World Pork Expo.

During each session, participants can ask questions to industry expert presenter from the comfort of their home, office or swine unit. Each registration provides access to one Zoom connection per session and all program materials provided by presenters.

The cost is \$200 for the first registration and half that amount for each subsequent registration from the same entity.

Registration is due Jan. 15, 2026, to ensure participants have access to materials for the first session on Feb. 4. A flyer with information and registration form is available on the Iowa Pork Industry Center website.

Virtual Field Day to Compare Greenhouse Gas Emissions of Feedstocks for Bioenergy Production

Iowa Learning Farms, in partnership with C-CHANGE: Grass2Gas, will host a virtual field day on Thursday, Jan. 22, at 1 p.m. Central time. The event, which is available at no cost, will feature a live discussion with Hyeonji Song, postdoctoral research associate in the Department of Agronomy at Iowa State University.

Grass2Gas is examining the production of renewable natural gas and related bioproducts through the anaerobic digestion of plant biomass and manure. To help determine the environmental impact of the system, the team is comparing greenhouse gas emissions produced by different plant biomass feedstocks that are being considered and utilized in bioenergy production.

“Nitrous oxide is one of the major greenhouse gases, and agriculture accounts for 50% of nitrous oxide emissions, mainly through fertilizer applications,” said Song. “Cropping system emissions of nitrous oxide is an important factor in calculating the carbon intensity of biofuels. Our core hypothesis is that adding nitrogen fertilizer to prairie to increase its biomass production as a bioenergy feedstock will not increase nitrous oxide emissions.”

Any person interested in bioenergy production systems is welcome to attend the virtual field day. Participants are also encouraged to bring any questions they would like to ask.

Iowa dairy producers planning to apply for a 2026 Choose Iowa Dairy Innovation Grant are invited to attend grant-writing workshops designed to strengthen applications and improve competitiveness. Hosted by the Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Dairy Team, the 90-minute workshops will focus on practical tools and strategies producers can apply to their grant proposals.

The workshops are specifically designed for dairy producers who are interested in on-farm technology or processing projects. Participants will learn the fundamentals of creating a clear and compelling grant application, including understanding the grant submission process and developing the writing and communication skills needed for a strong proposal. The goal of the workshop is to help producers convert their on-farm ideas into robust, fundable proposals.

“The Choose Iowa program has been a phenomenal opportunity for dairy producers in the state,” said Gail Carpenter, assistant professor and extension dairy specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach. “Every year, the quality of grant applications continues to increase. Our goal for this program is to give producers practical tips for putting their best foot forward for this opportunity.”

ISU Extension and Outreach will host the virtual series on Thursdays, Jan. 22, Jan. 29 and Feb. 5, from noon to 1 p.m. and from 5:30-6:30 p.m. Iowans may participate in either the noon series or the evening series and online pre-registration is required by Jan. 13.

“This virtual series provides tools to help manage money effectively, make better financial decisions and live according to your priorities,” said Barb Wollan, a health and human sciences educator. “If you’re ready to start fresh and feel confident about your money decisions, this program is designed for you.”

Participants will improve their financial wellbeing by developing an emergency spending plan, creating a prioritized bill paying strategy based on future consequences, developing skills to improve their own credit and learning strategies to manage debt.

The topics – prioritizing bills, protecting credit and managing debt – are presented in one-hour, online Zoom sessions.

Individuals may choose to register for either the noon series or the 5:30 p.m. series, as they will cover the same content. Health and human sciences educators with ISU Extension and Outreach will lead the program. Participants will learn research-based strategies to decide which bills and monthly expenses to pay first, how to protect their credit history, and how to manage debt even when money is short.

Sessions are free but pre-registration is required online by Jan. 13. After registering, participants will receive an email confirmation with the Zoom link and class information.

Planter University Workshops Focus on Optimizing Planter Setup across All Brands

Workshops to be held in five locations across Iowa

Specialists with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach are once again teaming up with ISU Agriculture and Biosystems Engineering specialists to bring planter equipment expertise to farms across the state Feb. 2–6 with Planter University.

The workshops are an opportunity for farmers, agricultural service providers, equipment and precision ag dealers and others to gain insight into how planters function; optimizing settings for individual seed, field, and equipment needs; and improving understanding of planter wear and calibration. Prior attendees have noted the value this workshop provides, with 80% of 2025 survey respondents stating it was worth more than \$10 per acre to their farming operation.

“Planter University goes far beyond a typical planter clinic and provides attendees direct access to specialists with expertise in planter technology and settings,” said Meaghan Anderson, field agronomist with ISU Extension and Outreach. “We are excited to host these workshops across the state again this February.”

Specialists from the ISU Digital Ag group will lead each workshop, focusing on small-group, hands-on learning with row units that represent a variety of technologies currently available for planters. The Digital Ag group is renowned for their key industry partnerships and unique expertise in equipment development and precision agriculture. Meetings will also offer continuing education credits for Certified Crop Advisers.

“We are going to help attendees better understand the physics behind traditional and high-speed planters and how to evaluate planting performance, because every planter, operator and operation is different,” said Levi Powell, Iowa State ag and biosystems engineering program specialist. “This event will focus on how to dial in the right settings for you and your operation.”

The training will be offered at five locations. Attendance will be limited to maintain small group sizes and allow for hands-on activities. Registration for each location is \$100 and closes seven days ahead of each meeting. On-site registration is not available, but online registration will be available starting Jan. 5.

Registration includes lunch, refreshments, reference materials and CCA credits. Registration check-in opens at 8:30 a.m., and the program begins at 9 a.m. The program concludes at approximately 3 p.m.
